# Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Owing to the spiritual nature of the church's objectives it is difficult to quantify achievements; however we have in the past year undertaken the following activities:

- As we do not at this current stage employ a pastor of our own, we invited guest speakers to preach at our Sunday services. From February 2014 to the end of July 2014, the church provided 25% support for the pastoral training of a young male member at a London based Theology College.
- We have run a Christianity Explored course on two occasions, with five and six individuals respectively attending each module.
- A children's holiday club with a mission basis took place in the Easter break with over a hundred attendees. Due in some part to this, the weekly Children's Club has seen its numbers increase from around 50 youngsters to nearer 70.
- The club for elderly people with learning disabilities (currently 17 individuals) had five day outings, including visits to gardens and places of interest.
- In the past year there have been five baptisms in the chapel. Two
  new families and several single people joined the church, another
  family and an older couple moved away, and one of our elderly
  members died. The church membership to date stands at 68
  individuals.
- The chapel's sanctuary saw the solemnising of two marriages and a Thanksgiving Service for the church's presence in the community over the past century.
- At Harvest time we distributed 1,500 gospel leaflets advertising the Harvest service. The church also rented a stall to display evangelistic materials at the town's Saturday Market and this is now a regular event.
- We held bimonthly Men's Breakfasts and quarterly Ladies Craft Evenings. These were popular, with a general attendance of 15 – 20 men and 30 - 35 women respectively. Both events attracted non-church members on a regular basis and we plan to continue holding them.
- During the year some renovations were undertaken in the chapel, including an upgrade to the heating arrangements, particularly appreciated by the Mums & Tots group, which can exceed 45 mothers, carers and children on any given Tuesday morning in term time.
